I want to remind everyone that there are several places to find out if school has been cancelled due to inclement weather. The local TV stations should display this information. KCTV5, KMBC-TV9, FOX4- WDAF-TV and KSHB -TV on channel 41 are all included, as well as their affiliates.

That means the following channels should have school closing information: 4, 5, 9, 38, and 41. There are also several radio stations that announce school closings, including KDKD Radio (95.3 FM, 1280 AM, and 104.9 FM) and KMOE (92 FM). A third location for Ballard School closing announcements is our school web site, which is www.balladv2.net as well as the Ballard Facebook account. Also if you are included in the Remind account you will get a text stating the cancelation. Please keep in mind that whether school is cancelled or not, there are always disagreements on the decision. My philosophy on school closings due to weather is quite simple. when in doubt, error on the side of safety, which means cancel. The last thing we want is to risk the safety of the students or staff members here at Ballard. If you have any questions or concerns about this information, please contact me at any time.

If we should have school when there is snow on the ground and we would run the snow bus routes, it will be posted on the school's website and Facebook account. The Snow Bus Routes have been sent home with your student. We will only run snow routes if it is announced. It is also possible that we

may have a late start if needed to because of weather. It will also be sent out to the contacts included in the Remind account. If you do not have access to any of these, please let the school know in the very near future and we will make sure that we contact you by phone.

Again, Shane responded with a cautious laugh.

A few seconds later, my phone rang and it was Shane. "Coach, don't hang up on me!"

"I won't hang up on you if you won't hang up on you. We made a deal that you would imagine those things." Shane needed to imagine because, by doing so, when the time came and he actually found himself in those situations, he would feel as if he had already been there.

Allowing our students, you children, to imagine if they had already been there, gives them the opportunity to go into any situation with the confidence they need. I believe our goal is anything they would like to be.
