If the shot went in, the final buzzer sounded and I celebrated the victory. If I missed, there was, of course, a foul on the play and the game continued as I stood at the free throw line with no time on the clock. Though I enacted a broad range of imaginary scenarios throughout my youth, one thing remained the same: when I imagined, I always won!

Imagination gives you a destination. When you dream, and you feel what it is like to be inside that dream, you feel inspired to make that dream a reality. You begin a process, a journey, toward making real those feelings that you first found in your imagination.

The greatest gift a coach can give a player, a teacher can give a student, and a parent can give to his child is the opportunity to imagine great things. These dreams in childhood pave the way for future successes.




Red Ribbon Week a Juccess!


Two Volleyball Girls Picked for All-Conference
