

This quarter we have been studying for the MAP test in English and in Science. We are learning about animals and plants in science also. In history we are talking about World


War Two. We are going to take a test on Friday in Ag class. In art we are learning about different types of lines. This year is fun and we really hope none of us get quarantined.



Hello fellow mathematicians,

The answers to the last edition of Math Corner are at the end of this edition.



Elementary Riddle (K-4):

Q. How many squares can you find in the following figure?

Middle School Riddle (5-8):

Q. Refer to the Elementary riddle, how many toothpicks would you need to recreate this figure if one side of the smaller squares is one toothpick long?

High School Riddle (9-12):

Q. Refer to the Elementary and Middle School riddles, how can we generalize these numbers and expand the square to a 4x4, 5x5, or nxn?

Elementary Riddle (K-4):

- Q. I found a box of ornaments in my basement. When I opened it up, all of them were blue except for six, and all of them were green, except for six, and all of them were red, except for six. How many of each color ornament were in the box?
 - A. If all were blue except six, all green except six, and all red except six, then there must be three of each color.

Middle School Riddle (5-8):

- **Q.** Santa has 9 reindeer (if you count Rudolph). If Santa, the sleigh, and all the presents weigh a literal ton, how much weight does each reindeer need to pull to distribute the weight evenly?
- **A.** One ton is equal to 2,000lbs. To evenly distribute the weight, just take 2,000 divided by 9 and you get approximately 222.2 lbs each.

High School Riddle (9-12):

- **Q.** The distance from pole to pole around the world is 24,901 miles. At what average rate would Santa need to fly to go from pole to pole in one night (assume "night" is defined as 10 PM to 5 AM)
- **A.** Rate can be related to distance and time using the formula r = d/t, so we can just plug in the numbers we have and simplify. Rate = 24,901 miles/7 hours which is approximately 3557.3 miles per hour.




