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Student Handboek

STUDENT REGULATIONS				
 Public displays of affection are not allowed at school or activities. This includes any inappropriate touching of the breasts, buttocks, or genitals, kissing, hand- holding, and hugging. 				
2. Hats shall <u>not</u> be worn at school unless part of a special program or activity which has approval from the administration. Remove your hat immediately upon entering the building and leave the hat in your locker during the school day. Upon dismissal, hats may be worn once outside.				
3. Students may only use school facilities while under the direct control or supervision of an employee or by an approved 'Application for Use'.				
4. Dangerous items including knives, sharp metals, and weapons are not allowed on school property.				
5. Any action that impedes or blocks education for any student will be considered as a problem and the student(s) causing the problem will be dealt with for the good of the total school program.				
6. DRESS CODE - The dress code for students requires that clothes be neat, clean, and in good repair (no frayed ends); do not advertise items in bad taste; such as death, tobacco, vapes, drugs, alcohol, and violence; do not draw attention away from education; and do not have vulgar, immoral, suggestive slogans, words, pictures or unlawful items displayed.				
 Nothing may be worn that exposes the chest, midriff, or buttocks area. Shirts or blouses must meet and cover the waistband of the pants, skirts, or shorts at all times. 				
 Flip-flop sandals are highly discouraged during cold weather and for use on the playground, they are a dangerous trip hazard when playing and boarding the bus. 				
 All pants, shorts, and skirts must be worn at the waist and not sagged down around the buttocks and must be a respectable length. Jeans, pants, and shorts with distressed marks and holes can be worn. Distressed marks and holes must fall below fingertip length while standing up straight 				
 with feet flat on the floor; no matter the student's height. No distress marks or holes can be in the buttocks area, no inside pockets can be seen, and no undergarments should be showing. Miniskirts and short shorts are not allowed. All skirts and shorts must be long enough so that, when standing, and your hands are at your sides the garment 				
reaches the tip of your fingers or is longer. Modesty and full coverage is the objective here. Regardless of the activity the student is involved in the shorts or skirt must fully and completely cover the buttocks area.				
 Spandex, leggings/jeggings, and biking shorts (unless covered by other clothing) are not allowed. Any form of mesh or see-through clothing, bare midriffs and shirts with excessive side openings, spaghetti straps or other shirts that expose excessive skin or undergarments (which should be worn at all times), short shorts, and lounge and sleeping attire are not permitted (pajama day is an exception). In short, please dress for school in appropriate attire that displays, to anyone 				
 entering our school, an atmosphere of learning. Clothing must be worn in a manner that does not allow undergarments to show. 				
 Students who do not take corrective action when requested by a teacher shall be referred to the office for corrective discipline. No sunglasses, face paint, wigs or other disruptive attire may be worn without prior administration approval. 				
• When leaving the school campus for outside activities or participating in in-house events, including, but not limited to sports and FFA events, scholar bowl, and math relays students must wear clean jeans or pants free of holes or tears or an appropriate dress or skirt of appropriate length. Shirts should be clean, without tears or stains, collar preferred such as a polo or knit shirt. T-shirts with logos should not be worn. If a class is attending a field trip the regular school dress code applies or dress code rules will be communicated. Remember you are representing Ballard. (update 3/9/23)				
When, in the judgment of the principal, a student's appearance or mode of dress disrupts the educational process, or constitutes a threat to health or safety, the student may be required to make modifications.				
 7. Each student's hair should be neat and clean. 8. Alcoholic beverages, controlled substances, possession of tobacco, and vaping products are not allowed at school or any activity. This includes any extracurricular or 				
school-sponsored activities. Assistance for abuse of alcohol or controlled substances may be obtained through the:

School Health Nurse 660-679-5096. 9. Dances: Students bringing non-BHS students or non-BHS alumni as guests must get a permission form from the office. The form must be faxed by the guest school to				
 before school dismisses that day. Students leaving the building without special short-time permission from a sponsor or administrator cannot return. 				
 Dress must be appropriate for the event and as promoted. Guests are under the responsibility of the student bringing them and as a guest, they have agreed to the same rules and policy. 				
 If anyone arrives and there is an indication that they have used alcoholic beverages, tobacco, vapes, or a controlled substance, admittance will be denied and parents/guardians will be contacted as well as law enforcement. 				
 Any action by any student that creates difficulty for the total good of the dance will be considered in violation and will be asked to leave or law enforcement will be called. To attend Prom a student must be in the 9th grade or above and cannot be 21 years of age or older. 				
 Ballard students shall positively represent their school at all times. 				
12. Portable electronic devices are only to be used during class time with the approval of the class teacher or administration. They can be used before/after school, and at lunch (secondary students).				
13. At the end of the school day ALL students must be out of the building no later than 3:45 unless there are special circumstances. Special circumstances include but are not limited to:				
 parent running late and the school has been notified an emergency situation and a student has not been picked up yet 				
 Eighth Hour students and any student in after-school detention sports games/practices or activities and students are under the supervision of a coach or teacher (younger siblings may not stay with older siblings) 				
• on game days, students must have permission to remain on school grounds before the game starts or the bus leaves. This permission is granted by the coach (es) or a teacher and students must be supervised.				
14. Locker rooms are off-limits during the normal course of the day. Locker rooms may be utilized for PE and game purposes ONLY.


The Ballard staff have said about Dayne: "Dayne was very grateful for some opportunities that were presented to him. He decided to take advantage of the new opportunities even when they






