












From the Science Classroom:

As the year comes to an end, I want to say thank you to everyone who has supported me inside and outside the classroom. YOU have amazing young adults! I have enjoyed every moment I have gotten to spend with them- yes, even on the frustrating days. Each class has done exceptional work this year.

To end the year, junior high will have units about how we need to be good stewards of our land, resources, and respect nature. The high school will be learning how to reduce their ecological footprint and making better choices about their environment.

The 7th grade is going to wrap up with the "It's All Connected" unit. I like this unit because it gets us out of our comfort zones and into nature. Quick shout out to MDC for the resources to make this unit possible. The 8th grade will finish up with a "Water" unit. 




















## Grade School




